### Policy dialogue: Leading Inclusion and Belonging in Schools

Constant change is a reality within the school sector, and our approach to policies focused on inclusion and belonging needs to keep pace with this change. Evolving these new policies and associated practice to tackle emerging issues, continuing to create innovative solutions to perennial problems, anticipating developments that will affect the nature of our student and staff communities is our constant goal.

The challenges facing school systems are varied and complex, and no single approach to tackling them will suit the diversity within the sector. Curiosity about the wide range of policy thinking and practice that might inform our approaches, openness to listening to others, an engagement with what we learn from marginalised voices and experiences, and collaboration with policy makers from across the globe are the tools that will equip us to craft inclusive solutions that are relevant, effective and sustainable.

If the inclusion of all children and young people is to be successful and sustainable then it must be predicated on an approach that is achievable, empowering, and based upon a thorough and sensitive understanding of the current context of the particular school and education system. The commitment to developing more inclusive schooling therefore requires a multi-tiered response that addresses policy, practice and culture at all levels within the education system.

This conference will focus on three key themes related to the leadership of inclusion and belonging within school systems:

- The education and inclusion of pupils with special educational needs and disabilities
- Gender equality and in particular, the education and inclusion of girls
- Language of instruction as a barrier to and enabler of inclusion and belonging















#### This conference aims to

- offer policy makers the opportunity to discuss their current context, policy direction and challenges in relation to inclusive education
- form international networks to discuss and debate educational issues, specifically, the issues associated with ensuring that all children have access to high quality education
- support the improvement and development of inclusive school systems by sharing international evidence, insight and effective practice into 'what works' in relation to creating more inclusive school systems

This will be a participatory event comprising a mix of keynote presentations, workshops, and group discussions to ensure that there is time for learning, reflection and networking. There will also be an opportunity to visit an inclusive school in Nairobi. The working language of the event will be English.
